PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends.

It's the time of year when I start scouring gardening websites for advice. I find a lot of competing advice. Direct sowing vs. transplating. Hot composting vs. cold. I'm intrigued by the two letters in the center. The two letters, "vs."



The word, "versus," is a mighty word. It implies there is a right and a wrong. It implies that something will win and something (or someone) will lose. "Versus" sets up opposition and conflict.

Our themes for the Sundays in Lent - inten-

tion/action, stranger/neighbor, faith/works, rest/growth, lost/found, righteousness/mercy, shouting/silence, power/humility, acceptance/resistance and grief/hope – have often been set up as opposing forces. We have been led falsely to assume we must choose one or the other.

As we move through Lent, I invite you to join me in reflection on how these forces can work together. How times of rest can lead to times of growth; how a quest for righteousness can make us more merciful as a community and individuals; how intentional learning and research can lead us into more fruitful action.

Our world has become more fractured and fragmented. Jesus invites us to live intentionally in the midst of the "mess." Jesus invites us to be a people of peace, healing, listening and advocating right smack in the middle of all that is broken. Jesus invites us into a balance of love and justice, peace and righteousness.

There is no "versus" in Christ's church. There is only one community drawn together by the grace of God and the sacrificial love of Christ into resurrection life! Thanks be to God!

At our meeting on March 6th, Council reviewed our financials and received an update from the Outreach Team. (Each month, one ministry team provides an in-depth report.) We discussed the end (probably until July) of funding for "pooled" grants from Foodlink that allow us to purchase food at a deep discount. Along with the Food Pantry Team, Council will monitor our Designated Fund balance (currently a little over \$20k), and determine if any action is needed before the new fiscal year for grants begins.

Lisa Klima has volunteered to serve on Council, leading the Adult Faith Formation Team. We elected Lisa to the Council until the next Annual Meeting, at which point the congregation will be asked to elect her to the remainder of her standard 3-year term. Welcome Lisa!

Other topics of conversation included: creating a better calendar of upcoming events for the congregation, looking for a secure way to display one or more Pride flags so they are visible from the street, and a brief review of our current Mission and Vision Statements. Our conclusion was the Mission Statement is good, and the Vision Statement would benefit from some updated language, perhaps borrowing from our Statement of Welcome.

Property News

It is a nice sunny day as I write this article. Tomorrow the temperature is forecasted to almost 60° and that will be fun and enjoyable. Now that the snow is melting away, we can see some of the litter that has accumulated on Messiah's lawns over the winter. The 6-month inspection of our elevator is due this month and our inspector is coming March 11. While he is onsite doing his job, maybe I'll wander around the lawn and pick up some trash. Actually, from April to November, the guys and I cruise the lawn weekly, picking up litter. If you'd like to help the property guys by performing this low stress and easy job, let me know.

It is the first Monday of Daylight-Saving time and the guys spent some time resetting all the time pieces in Messiah this morning. How many clocks could there be you're saying? Well, there are only 5 or 6 wall clocks. But there are 8 thermostats for our hot water heating system and their time must be updated. Next, there are 15 thermostats for the VRF system, and each needs their time updated. This is not hard work, but you know how it is – you must remember how it works. Now, where is that menu? Do I use the up arrow, or down arrow to get there? What's this arrow do?

Oops, I made a mistake, how did I get into this menu and how do I exit out of it??

Additionally, our 5:00 pm service was just discontinued. So, in addition to resetting the thermostats' time, we adjusted the Sunday heating schedule. It is no longer necessary to keep the temperature in Messiah up through Sunday evening. We also checked the operation of the carbon monoxide detectors – we have 3. One by the kitchen, one in the small boiler room and the last by the bottle recycling containers.

The fire department suggests checking your smoke detectors when you adjust your clocks. Every wonder about the Sanctuary and where its detectors are? Well, the next time you are in the Sanctuary and gaze up at the lighted cross, look slightly to the left and then the right. You will find two square modules mounted above the long speakers. Each one shoots out a laser beam the length of the church towards two mirrors up in the choir loft. The beams bounce off the mirrors, and back to those modules where a receiver is watching for it. If there was ever to be smoke in the Sanctuary, it would interfere with those beams, break them up. The system would trigger the alarm panel, causing the audible and visual fire alarms to activate and the panel would also call the alarm monitoring company.

OK, that's all for this month. Once again, thank you to all who help maintain our facilities. As always, if you see something broken, or out of whack, or dirty, or have a suggestion, let me know. Paul 585-732-5127 paulmwilliams01@hotmail.com
